



Primate Behavior, Wildlife Ecology & Conservation Field School in Kenya

Conducted annually for 4 weeks in August, the Primate Behavior, Wildlife Ecology and Conservation Field School (PFS) is a 6 credit summer course from Rutgers University held in the Lakipia Plateau in Central Kenya and the Tana River Primate National Reserve in Southern Kenya. You will travel to the Mt. Kenya Animal Orphanage where you will be introduced to a plethora of Kenyan wildlife including Black and White Colobus Monkeys, the endemic Bongo and Cheetahs! At Mugie Ranch you will camp with Zebra, Buffalo, Elephants and radio-collared Lions. In the Tana Reserve you will collect field data on two endangered monkey species, the Tana River Crested Mangabey and the Tana River Red Colobus, as well as Baboons.
